Reading: Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

¹Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. ²Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. ³By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

⁸By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. ⁹By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. ¹⁰For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. ¹¹By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old—and Sarah herself was barren—because he considered him faithful who had promised. ¹²Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, “as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.”

¹³All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, ¹⁴for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. ¹⁵If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. ¹⁶But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

Gospel: Luke 12:32-40

[Jesus said:] ³²“Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father’s good pleasure to give you the kingdom. ³³Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. ³⁴For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

³⁵“Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; ³⁶be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he comes and knocks. ³⁷Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them. ³⁸If he comes during the middle of the night, or near dawn, and finds them so, blessed are those slaves.

³⁹“But know this: if the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. ⁴⁰You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.”

Praise to You, O Christ

Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

At first reading there seems to be a bit of a disconnect between the two sections of this Gospel text.

The first section starts out with Jesus offering assurance to a crowd that we get a sense may be a touch fearful of what their future looks like. It does us good to look back and see just what it is that Jesus has been saying to them that may have them feeling this way.

Last Sunday was Jesus telling them a parable of a Rich Man’s greed. In his story, Jesus doesn’t so much rail against that this man was rich, he essentially doesn’t mention his possessions at all, but he does go after his actions. It is Jesus approach that one can, indeed, be rich, but one cannot, indeed, be lazy. That is not what the Kingdom of God asks of us.

Jesus goes on, in the section of Luke 12 that we do not hear in our Sunday texts, to tell his followers not to worry. In fact, worrying will do nothing for you! We remember that the feelings in which our greed is rooted, are feelings rooted in worry. Our greed stems from fear and self-preservation.

Jesus tells them not to worry. Look at the birds of the air. They don’t build up barns, yet, they eat. Are we not more important than birds?

So, Jesus offers a word of comfort. A message of the assurances of God’s love. “Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father’s good pleasure to give you the kingdom.” Seeing the concern on their faces regarding what it will mean to live out this life that he has called them to, Jesus speaks into their fear and hesitancy to live a life of joyful generosity.

Jesus takes a leap now to what it means to be ready. He tells, again, a story. This time the story is of a master and his servants. It is the master’s desire to come and find his servants ready to serve. “Blessed are those servants whom the master finds alert when he comes.” Blessed are those ready to serve.

Going beyond the selected text for this Sunday, to a section that will be skipped in our selected Gospel passages, Jesus offers a stern warning for those who are NOT ready to serve, but also to those who are ready to serve but are boastful about it.

Here Jesus is calling his followers not just to service, but to humble service.

As people of faith we struggle with this call to be readily available to serve God when needed. Just weeks ago Jesus encountered this when there were eager members of the crowd that wanted to be his followers. When he called them they were quick to point out that there were other matters they must take care of first.

We do the same thing. We see an opportunity to serve God by serving our neighbor and we are quick to come up with reasons why we aren't actually the ones called to serve that particular situation.

When talking about opportunities to serve our neighbor that we frequently encounter, we often find ourselves discussing the portion of our population that we will see on the street corner asking for assistance. More often than not, but not always, we turn the other way.

And our reasons are plentiful.

I don't have cash (there are ATMs all over town and the cashback feature is very handy whenever you purchase something).

If I did give them cash they'd spend it on booze (then buy them food).

They're probably scamming me anyways (then ask them their story).

They're sitting right next to a "We're Hiring" sign (yes, and if they walked into that place looking how they look do we really think they'll get hired? And, is their pay going to be enough to keep them off of the street? Let's be honest).

We soon realize that the reasons we can't help them aren't necessarily they're fault, but are a product of the world we live in. Culturally we marginalize those who have significantly less than we do, rather than looking at them with compassion with an eye towards what we can do to help.

And, while it may very well be true that the problems of this world are a product of this world, we must ask ourselves the question:

Does this change what the Gospel is calling me to do?

All of those questions we ask, all of those reasons we give ourselves for why we can't help that person we need, is that what the Gospel calls us to do?

The answer as no.

Jesus says, "where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." That treasure is in heaven. That is where our heart ought to be set towards as well.

People of faith the call of the Gospel is to go and do the work of the kingdom without hesitation, without questions of why we can't. The call of the Gospel is to go and do the work of the kingdom, and to do so in faith, which is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things NOT seen.

And we are reminded that when that day comes, the Master (Jesus) who finds us ready to serve, will tie his belt around his waste, and invite us to that heavenly feast.
