# Third Sunday of Easter April 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2023

## Introduction to the Day

Today's gospel begins with two disciples walking to Emmaus, overcome with sadness, loss, and disappointment. They had hoped Jesus, who was crucified, would be the one to redeem Israel! Yet the risen Christ walks with them and then opens their eyes in the breaking of the bread. Each Sunday our hearts burn within us as the scriptures are proclaimed and Christ appears to us as bread is broken and wine is poured. The story of Emmaus becomes the pattern of our worship each Lord's day.

## Children's Message

**Gospel:** Luke 24:13-35

<sup>3</sup>Now on that same day [when Jesus had appeared to Mary Magdalene,] two [disciples] were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, <sup>14</sup> and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. <sup>15</sup>While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, <sup>16</sup>but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. <sup>17</sup>And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad. <sup>18</sup>Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" <sup>19</sup>He asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, <sup>20</sup> and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. <sup>21</sup>But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. <sup>22</sup>Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, <sup>23</sup> and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. <sup>24</sup>Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him." <sup>25</sup>Then he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! <sup>26</sup>Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?" <sup>27</sup>Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

<sup>28</sup>As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. <sup>29</sup>But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So he went in to stay with them. <sup>30</sup>When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. <sup>31</sup>Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. <sup>32</sup>They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" <sup>33</sup>That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. <sup>34</sup>They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" <sup>35</sup>Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

#### Praise to You, O Christ

#### Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

In this season of Easter we hear resurrection account after resurrection account after resurrection account. Just last week we heard of Jesus appearing to the disciples and bringing them a word of peace. Poor Thomas was absent and struggled to believe what had taken place. He needed, he yearned, for his own resurrection encounter. And a week later Jesus appears again. Thomas sees. Thomas believes.

In that account the disciples found themselves locked in their own grief, afraid of who might be after them, and Jesus shows up. We hear that in the tomorrows that do come, Jesus brings peace and sends us out into the world to do the work.

In our Gospel text for today, we find ourselves again on that first day. The day of the resurrection. Luke's gospel has two of the disciples seemingly headed home. On the road to Emmaus. We encounter two disciples ready to move on with their life. This man they have followed for the last few years is now gone, to carry on what he taught them would be detrimental to their safety, so they're heading home. Back to whatever it was that they used to do.

Then Jesus shows up. And walks along the road with them.

Now, we know Jesus to have had some pretty remarkable things happen in his life.

The Jesus we know calms storms, walks on water, feeds thousands with next to nothing, and has the heavens open up and God declaring, "this is my Son, my beloved, with whom I am well pleased.

We know that Jesus *could* have made a grand appearance to them. But he didn't.

Coming alongside them in their grief and wondering about the future, Jesus walks with them. He lets them process all that has happened, almost playing dumb. And then recites to them all that the prophetic texts told them would happen.

But they still didn't know.

And he is ready to move on. He was prepared to NOT make it known to them that it was him.

Thankfully, they were Jesus followers, and they know what to do with a wandering stranger on the road at the end of the day. "Come in. Eat with us."

It is in that invitation that they have their own resurrection encounter. It is in that invitation that they realize they have all that they will need for the tomorrows ahead.

Jesus is revealed to them, their tomorrow is realized, in the breaking of bread.

They encountered their tomorrow in what was familiar to them. There were no angels. They weren't peering into the empty tomb. They were headed back to what they knew best. Ready to tackle their new normal. And Jesus showed up. Walked alongside them. And then reminded them of their time together.

People of God, we so often look for the resurrection in the spectacular. We find ourselves in our own Holy Saturdays wondering what thing will make us realize the resurrection. What moment will reveal to us what we need for our tomorrows.

But, truth be told, that isn't how it happens.

The Risen Christ, the resurrection, is revealed to us in the things we know. For those disciples and for us it is in a meal that they so often shared. When Jesus did for them what he always did. He broke bread. That is where they find what they will need for the tomorrows ahead. And that is where we find it, too.

We find ourselves a part of a community of believers seeking its own resurrection encounter again and again and again. Wherever we are at in our own Holy Saturdays Christ comes along side us, walking with us, reminding us of the things we know, and the experiences we hold dear.

And we look back on our own Emmaus Road walks, and are reminded that he is made known to us in the breaking of the bread.

With three Sundays to go in April the opportunity is in front of us to build up the cushion for the typical drop in summer giving.


## Feeling Generous?
