### Introduction to the Day

Today is sometimes called "Good Shepherd Sunday." Jesus is called the "gate" of the sheep in today's gospel. The risen Christ opens the way to abundant life. He anoints our heads with oil and guides us beside the still waters of our baptism. Each Sunday he spreads a feast before us amid the world's violence and war. We go forth to be signs of the resurrection and extend God's tender care to all creation.

**Gospel:** John 10:1-10

[Jesus said:] <sup>1</sup>"Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. <sup>2</sup>The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. <sup>3</sup>The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. <sup>4</sup>When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. <sup>5</sup>They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." <sup>6</sup>Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. <sup>7</sup>So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. <sup>8</sup>All who came before me are

#### Praise to You, O Christ

#### Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

Our Gospel text for this Good Shepherd Sunday takes us back in time regarding where we find ourselves in Jesus' life and resurrection.

The first three Sundays of the Easter Sunday bring us texts of resurrection encounters, from the empty tomb to Thomas and the rest of the 11 in the locked room, to the other disciples on the Road to Emmaus, all of our texts are literal resurrection encounters.

And, with them, we are able to imagine what those encounters would have been like for us, while also thinking about where it is that we see those moments in our own lives now.

Now, on this the Fourth Sunday of Easter, Good Shepherd Sunday, we are presented with a moment before Jesus' death, where he is just coming off of a Q&A that stems from the healing of a blind man. In that Q&A, Jesus launches into a parable.

Jesus is the Good Shepherd, and those who follow Him are His sheep. They know his voice. They come when he calls them. They do not stray. But, if they do, he will find them.

This leaves us feeling good knowing that we have the Good Shepherd watching over us, so good in fact that we name churches after this image. Because it is good to be looked after, cared for, and guarded against the "thief" that may come to scatter us or take us away.

But, how does this inform our post resurrection life as Easter People? What does this have to with the tomorrows that we face each and every day? What does this say to the Holy Saturdays that we spend longing for our own resurrection encounters?

1) There is a refrain theme repeats itself throughout this text: Being known

- a. "The sheep hear my voice...and they come to me."
  - i. This is Jesus giving guidance to his followers for what they will need for life beyond. This exchange is part of Jesus telling his followers that he will one day be gone from this earth, but that doesn't mark the end for them.
  - ii. "They follow Him (the Shepherd) because they know his voice"
- b. "He calls His own sheep by name."
  - i. We know there is great meaning in our names. If you've ever named anything at all, you know the weight that name carries. And, to hear your name called feels good.
  - ii. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, knows our names. But, not only does He know our names, he calls us by name, telling us that we are known by God our creator.
- 2) Though this is a pre-death and resurrection text, Jesus tells us what it means for us and our future, our life beyond.
  - a. As we find ourselves in this Easter Season wondering about our own Tomorrows and what we will need for them, Jesus tells us what Holy Saturday is all about. It is our belief as people of faith that on that Holy Saturday of waiting between Friday's crucifixion and Sunday's resurrection that Jesus descended into hell. That is in our statement of faith. And on that day, in descending to hell, Jesus defeated sin, death, and the power of the devil, and on Sunday rose victorious.
  - b. This does not mean that we don't sin, never experience death, and are pulled in different directions by the power of the devil. It DOES mean that those things do not have the final say. Those things do not have victory over us. In fact it is the opposite.
  - c. Jesus tells those who are listening that day, "the thief (we assume the devil) comes to steal and kill and destroy. I CAME THAT THEY MAY HAVE LIFE, AND HAVE IT ABUNDANTLY!"

In all of his talking in parable, Jesus realizes that what how is talking to those who listen is making no sense. The Shepherd is a wonderful image, but they missed it. And it is in his realization that they aren't understanding what he is telling them that we get from this what we need as we face our own tomorrows.

Jesus comes that we might have life and have it abundantly.

Now, do we know what that actually means? Like all things about life eternal, no, we don't necessarily have a clue what he's talking about.

What does it mean to have life abundantly?

People of God, that is on us to figure out. What does it mean for us as people of faith, a community of faith, to not only have life, but to have life abundantly? How do we live into that call that Jesus lays out for us? It comes back to what Jesus is trying to get at with his Shepherd/sheep imagery.

Sheep hear their Shepherd's voice and they respond to it. But they know the Shepherd's voice because he calls them by name.

We are each named in baptism as God's children. It is that promise, the promise of baptism, that we together live into figuring out what it means to have life and have it abundantly.

And, it is in THAT figuring out that we find what we need for tomorrow.

That is our mission.


To be certain that each person that comes into our building is KNOWN-SEEN-LOVED. By God and by us.
