Acts 1:1-11

[Luke writes:] ¹In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning ²until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. ³After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. ⁴While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. "This," he said, "is what you have heard from me; ⁵for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

⁶So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom

to Israel?" ⁷He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." ⁹When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Holy Gospel according to Saint Luke, the 24th chapter, verses 44-53

⁴⁴[Jesus said to the eleven and those with them,] "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled."⁴⁵Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. ⁴⁸You are witnesses of these things. ⁴⁹And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

⁵⁰Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. ⁵¹While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. ⁵²And they worshiped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; ⁵³and they were continually in the temple blessing God.

Praise to You, O Christ

Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

The Ascension. 40 days after the resurrection. Jesus takes his disciples "away," has a moment with them, and is lifted up into heaven.

We have spent the Sundays since Easter hearing what the resurrection means for us as people of faith and how these stories inform our own tomorrows, and now we hear Jesus ascends to heaven.

Our texts throughout this Easter Season have found us, for a few weeks, getting resurrection encounters that happened some on that very first day, and some within that first week. And then, for the next few weeks we went back in time to before the crucifixion to be reminded of what Jesus told his disciples, the assurances he gave them, before the crucifixion and resurrection ever happened.

Now, in our text today, we are back on that first day for a moment, before we jump ahead 40 days to when he ascends into heaven.

But he doesn't just leave them. He doesn't *disappear* from their sight.

Before he leaves them, he gives them an assurance, again, because of course he does. But more than that he gives them marching orders if you will. What comes next is what we have come to know as the great commission. Now, when we think of the Great Commission, I would bet that most folks familiar with that term think of Jesus telling his disciples, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them and teaching them all that I have commanded you."

That is the great commission from Matthew's Gospel. In all honesty, it sounds a lot more fun. It can even be used as justification to go into places and impose our will for the sake of "making disciples." It is the

justification for Luther's belief of being a priesthood of all believers. "Go and baptize!" Who doesn't want to do that?

As a camp counselor at Luther Park in 2009 I played the role of Jesus in the Christwalk every Thursday evening. Campers would walk through camp seeing scenes of Christ's life and hearing the stories that shape us today. Week one of that summer I nailed every single line throughout the play. Sure, I had a disciple in the front row for the sermon on the mount whispering line by line, but I didn't miss a single word. Until the end. The Great Commission. I appeared in the upper room with the disciples and proclaimed to them:

"Go therefore....(and my mind went blank.)"

The words never came to me. Until finally I gave up and proclaimed, "Go therefore...and do good stuff!"

It isn't necessarily wrong.

It is Matthew's Gospel, when talking about the Great Commission, that get's all the glory.

But, there is a great commission in Luke's Gospel as well. It maybe doesn't seem as fun as being given the marching orders to go and splash water in God's name, but it is equally as important.

Luke's Great Commission gets at the dirty work of Holy Reconciliation. "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷ and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem.

In Luke's Gospel, the marching orders that are given are to offer forgiveness to those who would repent. The building block of repairing relationship. To admit we have done wrong and forgive those who've wronged us.

It's no wonder that Matthew's Commission gets all the attention. Because splashing water proclaiming God's love for all people is a who lot easier, and, quite frankly, is a lot of fun.

So, we return to the question we've asked since the beginning of Lent. What do we need for tomorrow, and how does this inform my tomorrow?

Jesus tells his disciples what they are going to need in their post Jesus existence. He assures them that they have what they need to go into all the nations proclaiming the love of Christ to all people.

But what about us? What does this say to us?

One, we know they did it because we are here talking about, and if they hadn't, we wouldn't be.

Two, let's take a look at the other Gospel text we could have chosen for today. This is from John 17. Jesus is sitting around a table with his disciples. It is there last time gathered before his betrayal and arrest. He has just finished giving them a long talk, all good things, assurances of things to come and they have everything that they need to carry out God's mission in the world, and he stands up. He stands among his disciples and he prays for them.

And his prayer is this. He reminds them, in praying to God, of all the things that are to happen to himself and all that has been promised and entrusted to them. And those are all good, but then he gets to the meat of his message. His why. Their why.

"I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them...Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, SO THAT THEY MAY BE ONE, AS WE ARE ONE."

People of God, that oneness that we experience in our baptism that is Matthew's Great Commission is experienced when we dig into the Holy dirty work of Luke's Great Commission to repent and offer forgiveness.

It is that act that builds up the Body of Christ just as much as the fun splashing of water when we gather around the font.

In fact, the promise that we make around that font is that we will commit to that Holy dirty work for the sake of the Gospel.

People of God, let us continue to dig into the Holy dirty work of, yes, baptizing and teaching all that God commands, but also admitting that sometimes we mess up and sometimes we are wronged, but there is God's grace and forgiveness for that. And that is what builds up the Body of Christ.
