Praise to You, O Christ

Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

What in the world was that? T'his one of the more confusing stories Jesus ever tells. Truly a headscratcher.

The more and more we hear of Jesus' parables, the more we bring into question Jesus' ability to tell a story. He is a great preacher, but his story telling is subpar at best.

And I think he knows it. Thankfully, because he knows it, there are clues as to what he actually wants us to hear and know about what he has to say.

First, it begins with the "the Kingdom of Heaven will be like." 9/10 parables that Jesus tells start like this. This is our first clue that the story he tells is a parableNow, what do we know of Jesus' parables?

The collective understands is not a universally accepted stance but it is getting there, is that Jesus' parables were stories He told to illustrate a point, and not actually stories that happened. And often times, when he gets done telling a parable, he will say or it will elude to the fact that the crowd didn't understand what he was talking about. So, he will say what it is that he wanted them to hear. And that is the case here. "Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

Preceding this story in Matthew's Gospel is talk of the end times. Jesus quotes scripture telling the crowd what it will look like when the end times arrive, and uses this story (poorly told) to illustrate the importance of being ready when it does.

Knowing this, then, we are able to ask the question that Lutherans ought be good at asking, "what does this mean?"

What does it mean for us as people of faith that Jesus calls us to be prepared for we do not know when the end times will come?

Jesus in his story likens this to a wedding banquet. Half of the group wasn't prepared with oil for their lamps, and the other half was. When it came time to get to the banquet they needed to seek out new oil, while those who were prepared got to go in.

This confronts a little bit our understanding of a God who is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love. THAT God we wouldn't expect to close the banquet doors in our face. But that God does call us to be prepared.

What then does it look like for us as people of faith to have our act together in order to not be among those who don't get in?

Well, what do we know of God's desire for us? That we would be good, healthy, life-giving relationships with one another. At the root of a good, healthy, life-giving relationship is reconciliation. We are reconciled to Christ and in that are called to be reconciled to one another. And, in doing so we are reconciled to Christ.

This tackles perhaps one of the most difficult tasks as a person of faith...Forgiveness.

It is equally, if not more, difficult to ask forgiveness as it is to offer it. But, that is what Christ calls us to do. And, he tells us not to hold onto it. Don't wait. Don't put it off.

But, get your act together and get to it.

Our other reading for this day from Amos paints a picture of what God's idea of this might just be.

The prophet Amos speaks to those who desire the day of the Lord. Today, Amos might speak to those who declare that the end times are upon us.

But Amos questions those who desire this, and why exactly it is that they want the day of the Lord to come.

Taking that even further Amos declares "I hate, I despise your festivals, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies." And he goes further to tell them just how much he, a prophet, dislikes the things they do because they think they need to do them.

And, like Jesus, he wraps it up by telling them what it is that God does care about, what it is that God WOULD want them to give attention to.

"But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness ever-flowing stream."

It is God's desire for us to reconcile our relationships to one another, and in doing so reconcile what is broken in the world. Fight for justice and righteousness. Stand up to unjust systems that don't benefit all, and in that we will find that the oil in our lamp is always full.

People of God it isn't easy work. It never is. But it continues to be the work that God in Jesus Christ, speaking to us through the prophets calls us to do.

Perhaps the end times are upon us. Then what? What then do we need to tend to be prepared?

Thanks be to God. AMEN
