Holy Gospel according to Saint Matthew 25:31-46

[Jesus said to the disciples:] ³¹ When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. ³²All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, ³³ and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. ³⁴Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; ³⁵ for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, ³⁶I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' ³⁷Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? ³⁸And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? ³⁹And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you? ⁴⁰And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family you did it to me.' ⁴¹Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; ⁴² for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, ⁴³I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me. 44Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' ⁴⁵Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' 46And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Praise to You, O Christ

Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

We live in a skeptic society.

We hear something and our go to response is, "is that real?"

This has been shaped in part by the spread of technology and the ease in which truth can be altered, or stretched, to fit a narrative. And we have all done it. And we've perhaps all fallen victim to it as well.

Our Gospel text today, for this Reign of Christ Sunday has Jesus comparing himself to the many demographics that we are perhaps most skeptical about.

The hungry. The thirsty. The stranger. The naked. The sick. The imprisoned.

As a society we have written the stories for these demographics. We have ascribed the narratives that fit our feelings to their truly lived experiences.

It is next to impossible to travel from here to anywhere in Downtown Eau Claire and not pass someone that we would define as homeless. And the closer you get to certain locations the more dense this demographic becomes.

And, the almost immediate feeling we have when we encounter these situations is "how do I know they aren't scamming me? How do I know they aren't just going to go straight to the liquor store? Why is it up to me to help them? I didn't put them in that situation. They did!"

And I'm afraid we all do it.

Now, some of the excuses are almost too easy.

"I only carry credit cards. I don't have cash."

"The light turned green I need to go."

Never have modern day conveniences been so inconvenient.

But. Jesus, this Reign of Christ Sunday, the Sunday that wraps up our church year, where we hear and wonder together what it means that Christ is leading us and we live in His kingdom, tells us that what we do to the very least among us, these demographics for whom we have written the story, we do to him.

When we clothe them, give them something to drink, welcome them in, visit them, be the radically hospitable people of faith that we are called to be, we are doing that to Christ.

But, when we don't clothe them, don't give them something to drink, don't welcome them in, don't visit them in prison, don't be the radically hospitable people of faith that we claim to be, we aren't being that for Christ.

In a world where we want to prescribe stories to folks we have never interacted with; Christ calls us to prescribe His story to them. It is core to our beliefs as people of faith that we are made in the image of God. That, in the beginning when God created humans, God picked up the dust and clay of the earth, molded it, formed it, shaped it in the image of God, and breathed life into it.

What that means for us is that we are made in the image of God. That, when we look into the mirror it is the face of God looking back at us. When we tell ourselves all of the things we don't like about ourselves, or what could be better about ourselves, we are saying that what God has done is not perfect.

And, when we do the same thing looking at our neighbor: that it isn't our fault that they are hungry, or thirsty, or naked, or a stranger, or imprisoned, and thus is not our problem to fix, then we are saying that what God has done is imperfect.

This is a Holy indictment. And, know that I do not stand in front of you scolding you, rather I stand in front of you confessing this with you.

As Jesus speaks these words he is telling us what the Kingdom of God looks like. This is God's idea of life in God's Kingdom. And, when we speak of God's Kingdom, and hear Jesus speak of God's Kingdom, we realize it is not an image of what is to come, but rather what God desires it to be here and now.

This is God's hope for us as people of faith.
