Epiphany of Our Lord - Sunday, January 7, 2024

The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.

Holy Gospel according to Saint Matthew 2:1-12

¹In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ²asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." ³When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

⁶ And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,

are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

for from you shall come a ruler

who is to shepherd my people Israel."

⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹²And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

The Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to You, O Christ**

Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

This Epiphany story gives us a glimpse into the in-breaking power of the Incarnation. The Incarnation – God taking on human form and living among us.

The Magi, the wisemen, the astrologers, whatever you might call them, see a peculiar star at its rising and know that it is something they must follow. They knew the star was special. They knew that it marked the birth of the "Child, born King of the Jews."

So they went. They traveled to Jerusalem to King Herod to ask where this child might be. "Where is this child who has been born King of the Jews?"

This news shakes Herod to the core, and in this we see how what the Angels told Mary of the child that she is carrying, and what it means for the mighty and powerful plays out. "Herod is frightened, and all Jerusalem with him." Simply hearing of Christ's birth shakes Herod and the foundation of his power and his hold over his people.

So he devises a plan. Herod calls together all of the religious elite, he draws from all of the knowledge of the Scribes and Chief Priests and asks, "what are these men talking about? And, where might I find this baby they speak of?"

The religiously educated knew exactly what they were talking about. This is the exact thing the prophets had written about when they said, "from you Bethlehem shall come a ruler."

Knowing now where the could be found he implores the wisemen to go and find out the exact spot and return to him so that he, too, can pay him homage. Though we all know this was part of his plan to maintain his grip on his power and his people.

And so, they set out. Following the star that they had seen at its rising, they went until it rested over where they would find the baby. And when it stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. Again, this is a moment where we see the transformative power of God breathing life into the world. Simply seeing that they had made it, they were overwhelmed with joy.

This is the part of the story where we laughed a bit last week, with the cartoon of the wise-women arriving after the gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh brought by the wise men, the women had diapers, wipes, and a bottle of wine for the new mom.

Jan Richardson writes:

Wise women also came. The fire burned in their wombs long before they saw the flaming star in the sky.

They walked in shadows, trusting the path would open under the light of the moon.

Wise women also came, seeking no directions, no permission from any king.

They came by their own authority, their own desire, their own longing.

They came in quiet, spreading no rumors, sparking no fears to lead to innocents' slaughter, to their sister Rachel's inconsolable lamentations. Wise women also came, and they brought useful gifts: water for labor's washing, fire for warm illumination, a blanket for swaddling.

Wise women also came, at least three of them, holding Mary in the labor, crying out with her in the birth pangs, breathing ancient blessings into her ear.

We are again reminded of the in-breaking power of the Incarnation – God breaking into the world with the cries of a baby.

It's not the image of the peaceful quiet birth that many of us have been told in our childhood and throughout history. And that is okay.

And, it is okay because it reminds us that God isn't *just* present in the perfect, but rather, the Light breaks into every moment, making space in each second of our lives. Because that is how God came into the world. God who in the beginning breathed life into creation, at the Incarnation came crying into the world as a baby.

And we are reminded in this Epiphany story, through the prophetic texts, what this new King means for us and for all of God's people.

⁶ And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

It is this very prophecy that causes Herod to want to rid himself of his Jesus problem. Jesus is not the king that any would expect. Kings lord their power over their subjects. Kings don't shepherd. Shepherd's come alongside and compassionately care for those whom they lead. That's not what kings do.

But it is what Jesus does. And in this Epiphany story we are reminded that the Light of Christ knows no bounds, and can't be contained or kept out of whatever moments we might think it impossible for God to come into.

By taking on human flesh and living among us we are given a Shepherd King who compassionately comes alongside us in each of life's wild and crazy moments.
