#### Fourth Sunday after Epiphany – Sunday, January 28, 2024

In Deuteronomy God promises to raise up a prophet like Moses, who will speak for God; in Psalm 111 God shows the people the power of God's works. For the church these are ways of pointing to the unique authority people sensed in Jesus' actions and words. We encounter that authority in God's word, around which we gather, the word that prevails over any lesser spirit that would claim power over us, freeing us to follow Jesus.

#### Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark 1:21-28

<sup>21</sup>[Jesus and his disciples] went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. <sup>22</sup>They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. <sup>23</sup>Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, <sup>24</sup>and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." <sup>25</sup>But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" <sup>26</sup>And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. <sup>27</sup>They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." <sup>28</sup>At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

#### Praise to You, O Christ

#### Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

During my travels this past week I had an encounter that has stuck with me from the moment it happened. Actually, being in New Orleans, there were quite a few encounters that simply won't go away.

But, there was one in particular that will not leave me alone.

As I was preparing for the journey home, passing time in the Airport, I approached a doorway at the same time as a gentleman that was wearing a POW-MIA cap on his head. It was clear to me that he had served in the military years ago and I did as my father has engrained in me to do, and I thanked him for his service.

I thought that would be the end of that encounter. Until he responded with four simple words.

"You were worth it."

And that encounter has stuck with me since. The gentleman wearing the POW-MIA cap on his head, who pretty clearly served in the military told me, a complete stranger that many folks in the Airport gave the look of, "is that Matt LaFleur," that I. AM. WORTH. IT.

Trying to make sense of all of that and what it meant that this gentleman would tell me, and I'd imagine anyone else that thanks him for his service, I found myself reading this Gospel text.

For a bit of context, Jesus has just called the first of the disciples along the Sea of Galilee telling them, "follow me and I will make you fish for people."

They had heard about this Jesus fella, and you might even say this wasn't their first encounter with him. The chronology of the multiple accounts muddies these waters a little bit. However it all played out, them hearing Jesus say, "follow me and I will make you fish for people," made them hop out of their boats, immediately, and follow him. Leaving their father and their livelihood behind, they followed.

I would imagine there was some questioning about what fishing for people would look like. As a child at Luther Park, it was always my favorite part of being a part of "the crowd" during the Thursday evening Christwalk to shout out during this scene, "that's going to take a big net." I thought I was so funny!

Regardless of what they might have thought about what fishing for people would look like, as he always does, Jesus shows them.

As they are in Capernaum as the Sabbath approaches, Jesus and his followers entered the synagogue. During His time teaching in the synagogue there is a man there with an unclean spirit, a demon if you will, to which Jesus gives a command to come out of the man. And the demon does.

There are many parts of this story that I think we can latch onto, and rightfully so. But as I read this in the context of being told by a complete stranger who went to war many years ago that I was worth it, I can't help but think that Jesus is telling his followers that nobody is not worth it.

We live in a world that is dominated by stigma. So much of what we have come to know, and so much of what so many of our neighbors and ourselves are living with, is stigmatized.

Another encounter in New Orleans was a phonecall from a friend back home. I often refer to him as "the best Christian I know claims not to be one." He is everything that I hope any child I have ever baptized or given a blessing to would strive to become. He is generous, caring, compassionate, and won't back down from any cause he deems worthy. He is what a Christian should be, aside from not necessarily believing in Jesus.

But he called me about a fund he had started at the school in our hometown. He started this fund to ensure that children of families who have fallen behind on their lunch payments would still be able to eat lunch and even have their debts forgiven and a few months of lunch money covered. Someone wrote a letter saying that this is a form of welfare and the fund was canceled.

I think Jesus would say, "those children are worth it."

Mental Health, which you might say this Gospel text is about, is something that has been stigmatized in our society as well.

Another encounter in New Orleans was simply a shirt that I saw someone wearing that simply stated:

"It's okay to have Jesus and a therapist too."

Again, mental health has been stigmatized, and quite frankly church has played a dangerous role in this stigmatization, to the point that their needs to be a theological statement on a shirt that states that it is okay to have a therapist and be a Jesus follower.

Why? Because Jesus would say, "you are worth it."

Yes it is absolutely incredible the authority that Jesus shows that he has not only over the scriptures and his teaching, but the fact that he can demand a demon to come out of a person and that person would be healed.

And again, he just come from telling His new disciples to follow him and he will make them fish for people. Amid their wondering of what that will look like he shows them. To fish for people is to show love to those that the world is quick to show the exact opposite.

Jesus could have, like the rest of society at the time had done to the man with the unclean spirit, turned his back and paid no attention.

People of God, yes this story is about the authority of Jesus and the power he holds, and we can absolutely long for that message and wish that is what had been preached here, but we can't ignore that Jesus gives this person experiencing a mental health moment the time of day. He stops what he is doing and declares that making this person well is worth his time.

And, in doing so, he says to anyone who might be feeling like an unclean spirit has taken them over that they, too, are worth. God's love is greater than whatever this world we live in might tell you.

For Jesus, and for us as a church, you are known, you are seen, you are loved, and you are worth it.
