Introduction to the Day

This Sunday's image of the life the risen Christ shares with us is the image of friendship. We are called to serve others as Jesus came to serve; but for John's gospel, the image of servanthood is too hierarchical, too distant, to capture the essence of life with Christ. Friendship captures the love, the joy, the deep mutuality of the

relationship into which Christ invites us. The Greeks believed that true friends are willing to die for each other.

This is the mutual love of Christian community commanded by Christ and enabled by the Spirit.

Christ is risen!

Christ is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

Holy Gospel – John 15:9-17

[Jesus said:] ⁹"As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. ¹⁰If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. ¹¹I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

¹²"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. ¹³No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. ¹⁴You are my friends if you do what I command you. ¹⁵I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. ¹⁶You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. ¹⁷I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another." P: The Gospel of our Lord

C: Praise to you, O Christ

Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. AMEN

There is a distinct call in this Gospel text for us to be in relationship.

In fact, we hear Jesus longing for us to be in relationship with him!

The Easter Season Gospel texts actually bring us back to before the crucifixion and resurrection to moments in his ministry when Jesus tells His disciples what it is that he most wants them to remember. And so, in this continuation of our Gospel text from one week ago, we get the carrying on of the theme and buzzword, "abide."

To abide is to make a dwelling in. To make a home in. To remain in.

In John chapter 15 Jesus tells his disciples:

"Make a home in me a I make a dwelling in you! Those who remain in me and I in them bear much fruit. If you make a home in me and my words dwell in you, ask for whatever you wish and it will be done for you. As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you, make a home in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and dwell in his love."

As we hear Jesus speak of this relationship that he longs for we realize, we hear, that it is not some one-sided exclusively beneficial relationship, but rather it is a mutually beneficial relationship.

Jesus does not only call us to abide in him, to make a home in him, but rather tells us that in doing so he will also remain within us. We've seen, perhaps experienced, relationships before that are strongly one-sided. So often we see folks taken advantage of and relationships that are not a benefit to all parties involved, and we know they aren't fun. But Jesus calls us into a relationship that goes both ways benefitting all parties involved. Make a home in me and I will make a home in you. Again, this is a reminder that Jesus is giving his disciples about life after him before he has died. Remember, we have time-traveled to a pre-crucifixion conversation. Jesus is telling his disciples what it is that they NEED to know for life beyond his physical presence among them. Make a home in Jesus, but more importantly, make a home in Jesus' love!

As we think of love, in the Greek language, there are three types of love. There is *aeros, philos, and agape*. One of my good friends, Christian rapper Dave Scherer, goes by the name *Agape*. In one of his very first songs he defined these types of love as:

"Philos, that's the love I've got for my brother. *Aeros,* that's the love I've got for my partner. *Agape,* that's the love I've got for everybody in the world."

Jesus, in calling us to live into the love with which he loves us, is calling us into that unconditional agape love for everybody in the world. Jesus is calling us to think about how all that we do affects that love that we have for everybody in the world. All 8 billion. Now, we will most likely never meet 7,999,999,000 of those folks, but that does not mean that we are not in relationship with them.

Yes, our relationships for those that we experience that *aeros* love are much different than the relationships for those with home we have the *philos* love, and even more different than the relationships with those whom we will never meet, but each of these relationships is rooted in the unconditional *agape* love with which Jesus calls us to love.

Jesus tells his disciples there and then and he tells us here and now that this love is the kind of love that will have us lay down our lives for one another. He is headed for the cross. He knows that. It is what he is trying to get them to realize. He will literally lay down his life and die on the cross for them and for you and for me. Does that mean that we are to do as he died and die on a cross for our friends? Maybe not, but it does mean that we may need to lay aside some of those thoughts and feelings, those preconceived notions, those things that might be upsetting us about the other, and anything else that might keep us from fully loving all whom we are called to love, and that all that we are called to love is the other 8 billion people with whom we share this beautiful creation that we inhabit.

This Gospel text is one of those few moments in scripture where Jesus leaves nothing for the imagination. I don't know that we ever get a clear statement from Jesus regarding what it is that he wants us to hear and take from what it is that he says to us.

In this second half of John 15, Jesus changes our understanding of what it means to bear fruit. Jesus takes the hurt and other feelings we may have around that language, whatever it is that our life experience has formed us to think about bearing fruit, and he changes.

To bear fruit, as followers of Jesus, is to make disciples. To bear fruit is to live in such a way that people look at us and our actions and all that we do, and they think, "that person knows Jesus. I want to know Jesus. That person loves Jesus and is loved by Jesus. I want to know and be loved by Jesus to."

People of God, in changing our understanding of this sometimes initially troubling phrase of bearing fruit, Jesus tells us plain and simply that to bear fruit is to hear his commands SO THAT we may love one another.

For Jesus, it is that simple. Something that for us is sometimes so so difficult. For Jesus, is so so simple.

Love Jesus. Love others.. The end.
