Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are fending off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does?

Gospel - Mark 10:2-16

2Some Pharisees came, and to test [Jesus] they asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" 3He answered them, "What did Moses command you?" 4They said, "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of dismissal and to divorce her." 5But Jesus said to them, "Because of your hardness of heart he wrote this commandment for you. 6But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.' 7'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, 8and the two shall become one flesh.' So they are no longer two, but one flesh. 9Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate."

10Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. 11He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; 12and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

13People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. 14But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. 15Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." 16And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.

The Gospel of Our Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

Sermon

People of God, grace to you and peace from God, and from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. AMEN

Though they have now left the place they'd been in for the Gospel lessons of weeks past, Jesus continues the trend of pushing the envelope regarding the expectation of how it is that things are in the world. They've left the home where they'd been, in which Jesus taught them to disconnect from the earthly things

holding them back to fully experience the divine, to look out for the last and least among them, to realize that this work is not reserved solely for them simply because they are one of the twelve, and they now find themselves having journeyed from Capernaum to the region of Judea and beyond the Jordan, returning to the wilderness where Mark's gospel begins.

And crowds again gathered around him. He cannot escape them. They want to hear from him and learn from him, so, as was his custom, he again taught them.

It is during this teaching that some pharisees came and wanted to test him. They had it set in their mind what the answer to their question ought be, and to say otherwise surely puts them in the wrong. But, in answering this questioning that for many people brings with it some very real emotion. Chances are that just about anyone who hears this text today can go to some personal experience, and rarely are they easy emotions to conjure up. But, in answering their question, Jesus does what he has been doing for the last few weeks.

He challenges them to think beyond what they know to be, and are certain of, truth.

But, he doesn't do this until they enter the house, seemingly telling us the crowd is smaller. Up until this point he has essentially told his challengers, "you know the answers you want to hear, and quite frankly the chances of me changing your mind aren't great." For those who wished to test Jesus, it is a man's world. Men have power. They have privilege. And the dissolving of a marriage is theirs and only theirs to decide. An awful situation for a woman to be in.

But, upon entering the house, again with the crowd seemingly smaller, and we later get some clues as to who *else* was in the house, the disciples asked him to clarify. He at first echoes what he had said to those who tested him. "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; AND if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

Yes, the lesson here would seem that Jesus is against divorce. That seems an undeniable truth. But it is bigger than that. It has long been preached that it is God's desire in Jesus Christ that we are in relationship in one another, and in that relationship with one another we are in relationship with Christ himself. Jesus here, while seemingly teaching against divorce, is also teaching against this being a man's world. He gives place to women in the story. It was subtle. But it is there. To this point it would have been unheard of that someone would mention, "and if she divorces her husband..." but here we are. Jesus continually pushes the boundary to imagine a world where the vulnerable, the less than, the least, are seen as equals.

Whether that is the person we in favor of making ourselves look better, or the person we ought to be serving but instead step in front of, or the person that we continually put stumbling blocks in front of to ensure that we get it all, or the person that we continually think of as subject, Jesus continually think of those among us who are considered less than, and how it is that we might be in relationship with them.

Because, it is God's desire that we are in healthy relationships with one another, and in doing so find ourselves in healthy relationship with God in Jesus Christ.

Jesus knew his crowd in this teaching moment. It wasn't just the twelve. There were some mom's with their children not far off screen. And in this moment of being given a place, being seen as an equal, they bring their children to him, and we are again reminded...

"Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the Kingdom of God as one of these most vulnerable, will never receive it."

We so often want to look at situations, whatever they may be, as black and white. When the truth is that is rarely, if ever the case. The reality is we often have no clue what another's story might be. What their situation is. What their "why" may be.

But Jesus, time and time again, tells us to find that embrace. To find it within ourselves to be that presence of God's grace in whatever those moments and those stories may be.

And, he continually urges us, reminds us, let the most vulnerable come to me. God knows this world, our lives, each situation, is not perfect. And there is grace for that.
